Math Courses						
Friday	Algebra I	This course introduces students to solving linear equations, factoring, studying exponents and rational expressions, and problem solving. These are all reoccurring topics in higher math courses throughout the rest of high school and in college. This course ensures a solid foundation in Algebra to ensure there is no struggle when the time comes for their next math classes. Students will be assigned daily assignments to ensure the concepts taught in class stay fresh in their minds. Tests will be assigned but administered by their parent. Friday	Geometry	Overview of the course: This is a full year, high school level geometry course. The curriculum is a proof-based presentation of Euclidean geometry as a model of God's creative ability. Unlike some integrated geometry curricula, the course is designed to focus on the principles of logical reason used by Euclid in his original system of geometry. The course covers all familiar geometry (points, lines, planes, polygons etc.) with an emphasis on evaluating the reasons to make claims about these objects; this means a plain assessment of arguments from established fact. Mathematical concepts discussed in this course: Incidence geometry; Subsets of lines; Places and space; Segments and measurement; Angles and measurement; Preparing proofs; Congruence; Triangles and quadrilaterals; Area of two and three dimensional forms; Circles and the related geometric functions; Space and how geometry applies in three dimensions; Volume; Transformations and symmetry; Two-column proofs, heavy emphasis throughout the entire course. 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Friday	Algebra II	This is a full year, high school level course. Algebra 2 immediately builds on and develops concepts introduced in algebra 1. It is important that students complete Algebra 1 or equivalent prior to enrollment. The algebra sequence is best taken without interruption. This means Algebra 2 is best taken in the year immediately following algebra 1, although exceptionally motivated students may have no trouble returning to year-old skills and concepts. In most cases, re-learning algebra 1 in the process can be a frustrating experience for some students. 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Friday	Pre-Calculus	Pre-Calculus is a two-semester review of mathematics designed as a checkpoint preparatory for calculus. The course is designed with the college-bound student in mind, and is practically necessary for higher-level math for any stem and stem-related field (the traditional sciences like chemistry and physics, as well as academic fields like economics, business, and engineering). Pre-calculus is a prerequisite for many lower-division college courses, but can be quite challenging for many students. It is recommended that a student take both algebra 2 and geometry prior to enrollment, but a highly capable and intrinsically motivated student might still excel without these courses. It is, however, expected that a student be proficient in algebra prior to this course, as the skills presented are utilized and developed throughout pre-calculus. Monday	Plants and Proverbs (I & II)	Literature inspired by agriculture and its principles: This class will be held in an outdoor classroom where your student can see, touch, taste, smell, hear and experience every aspect of farm life for a few hours a week. A hands-on and full sensory agricultural experience -- coupled with classical and contemporary literary selections (biblical, fiction, and non-fiction) - where elements of agriculture are the focus. Our class sessions will provide a time for discussion, timed writing, projects, and presentations.
